Alberta Health Service Information

Mr. Lamer met with our Public Health Nurse this past week. There are some important updates and reminders for parents that will help us work closely with our partners from Alberta Health.

Important Information for Parents of Students in Grade 6 - School Immunization Program

Sasha Schnitzler, Public Health Nurse from Alberta Health Services was here on Tuesday to speak to our grade sixes. The Antigen/Immunization presentation provided students with information and an opportunity to ask questions about the immunizations that will take place this year. An immunization consent package from Alberta Health Services was sent home with most children in grade six last Tuesday. Some grade six students who were not at SAA last year will receive the package in the near future. Please check your child's school bag for this package which contains information about the vaccines that your child is eligible for in the <u>Grade 6</u> school based immunization program, along with a consent form for each vaccine. In order for your child to be immunized, each consent form must be signed and returned to your child's school by the date indicated on the envelope. In the past students were immunized in grade five but Alberta Health Services changed to grade six starting this school year. The Grade 6 Immunization dates at SAA are - Dec. 10/19, March 3/20 and June 10/20. Reminders for parents will be sent home closer to these dates.

<u>Important Reminders for Parents/Guardians of Children in Grade 1</u>

Please review your Grade 1 child's immunization records. If your child has not received their "preschool boosters" (given between 4 – 6 years of age) of Diphtheria, Pertussis, Tetanus and Polio (DTaP-IPV) and Measles, Mumps, Rubella & Varicella (MMR-Var) please make an appointment by calling Health Link (811). Anyone who has hair can get head lice, they're not caused by being dirty and they do not spread disease or illness. They do spread by touching heads with someone who has head lice. Reporting Illness

It's very important that parents report to the school the reason for a child's illness. It helps us to provide up to date information for Alberta Health. Please ensure that you let the school know about any confirmed case of Chicken-Pox or Measles.

Who doesn't like more options? We have upgraded from a minimum 2 pose per student standard, to a minimum of 3. This will give the parents additional pictures to choose from and our photographers the ability to capture a little more of the student's personality.

Complete Online Service

We are proud to say we have a user friendly program which makes ordering online much more convenient to parents and guardians. Parents can view all the poses close up, compare the poses side by side, and change the background on pictures that were taken indoors on our virtual background. Each gallery is personalized to the student and secured with an online proof code.

Online Order Forms

Online order forms with step-by-step instructions will be provided for the school to distribute to students on photo day. Images will be available to view within 2-3 business days. Our online ordering system has a secure PCI compliant terminal and accepts, visa, mastercard, visa debit and pre-paid visa/mastercard. Parents who cannot order online will be directed to Icon Customer Service and we will provide an alternative ordering method.

We have updated and simplified our family discount plan - 15% discount on all orders over \$75.00. This high volume plan will offer savings to everyone and not just families with multiple children. Code is: FAMILY19.

Emergency Drills Continue

We had our first Emergency Evacuation practice last Wednesday. Everything went well. We are planning to have a second and possibly third evacuation practice again this week as well as our first of two LockDown Drills and one On-Alert Drill. On-Alert is a procedure where all students and staff return to their classrooms, if kids are outside they come inside. Attendance is taken and normal classroom activities continue. It is used when there may be the possibility of severe weather in the area or perhaps there is an event in the area that may or may not affect our school. Sometimes we use On-Alert before implementing Hold and Secure or LockDown procedures. On-Alert is a procedure that tells staff to be ready for further instructions. Please be advised that we will always inform our students that we are executing a drill.

Junior High Stuff

On Wednesday morning, student leaders from St. Albert Catholic High School came to speak to Junior High students from SAA about the Communities of Hope Leadership Program. Jr. High students in all Greater St. Albert schools are invited to consider participating in a program that attempts to develop their leadership skills and learn how to set and meet goals to improve their wellbeing and the wellbeing of others working alongside High School students. Students participating in the program would be cabbed to St. Albert High School on the following dates Thursday, September 26th, Thursday, October 24th, Thursday, November 21st, Thursday, December 19th, Thursday, Jan. 30th, Thursday, Feb. 27th, Thursday, April 2nd, Thursday, April 30th, Wednesday, May 20th and Wednesday, June 10th. All times are from 1:20 to 2:30 pm. Students must indicate their interest in being in the program by Monday, September 23. Permission forms would follow. Students would be responsible for catching up on any material missed at school while gone. On Thursday afternoons this would be during option classes. Please have your son/daughter let Mr. Lamer know on Monday if they are interested.

Dropping Off of Students at School

We would like to thank you all for dropping your children in the student drop off zone along Joyal Way and parking in the visitor parking lot when you come to the school. This helps ensure safety for all children and ensures traffic flows as it was designed. We appreciate your cooperation. We are currently exploring the idea of adding the AMA Safety Patrol program to our school. We have also included Seven Tips for Safer School Zones from the AMA.

Back to school time means: lunches to pack, kids to dress, homework to finish, all before rushing out the door. It also means setting a good example of safety on the way to and from school, by following these school zone safety tips.

Avoid School Parking Lots

Poor visibility and cramped spaces make parking lots dangerous for drivers and pedestrians. Please respect 'No Parking' signs and encourage your kids to walk around, rather than cut through. Always slow to a crawl and be aware of small pedestrians when backing up. Even if there are visitor spots available, play it safe and park a block away to cut down on congestion.

... And School Bus Zones

Trying to park a school bus full of excited children is hard enough at the best of times. Buses have big blind spots and poor manoeuvrability, which is why we put the bus loading zones as close to the school as possible. Parking in the bus zone, even for a few moments, just adds to the congestion. When passing buses on foot stay at least five steps back from the bus and stay extra alert for pedestrians when driving by.

Point, Pause, Proceed at Crosswalks

Play show and tell with your kids – *tell* them how to cross safely using the Point, Pause, Proceed method, then *show* them you mean it by setting a good example. Use the crosswalk, cross at the corner, and make eye contact with drivers. Make sure the vehicle stops before stepping off the curb. Lead the way and watch your children follow!

Extra Attention in Drop-Off & Pick-Up Zones

The morning rush and after school pick-ups are the busiest times for teachers, parents, kids, and drivers. Minimize the risk by parking down the block and stretching your legs. Remember the sign with the stick child chasing the ball? Scan between parked cars, avoid bus zones, don't stop near crosswalks or let passengers out in the middle of the road. Avoid jaywalking and illegal u-turns. Help reinforce the safety message by leaving a few minutes early and taking your time.

Drive Distraction-free

By now we all know that being distracted behind the wheel can net you a <u>pretty hefty fine</u>. But did you know that around one out of every three collisions is due to driver distraction? Set a great example by staying focused, keeping your hands on the wheel and your eyes on the road. The same rules apply to pedestrians too — teach your kids to put the phone away, avoid headphones, and always be aware of their surroundings, especially around moving vehicles.

Don't Idle

When the weather is cold, it can be tempting to keep the motor running during pick-up time. But cold weather is particularly bad for vehicle exhaust, which lingers close to the ground where children breathe, triggering asthma attacks. Unnecessary idling also wastes fuel and is hard on your engine (not to mention the environment) – the best way to warm up a vehicle is to drive it. Let's follow our children's lead and help protect the environment by never leaving a vehicle running in a school zone.

Set a Respectful Example

Instead of pointing fingers, we want our students to join hands and come up with solutions to school zone safety challenges. When cyclists, drivers, and pedestrians share the responsibility and look out for each other, everyone stays safe. We've all heard the expression "Do as I say, not as I do," but it's time to start walking the talk in school zones. From obeying speed limits and no parking zones, to hopping off our bikes at crosswalks, and making eye contact with drivers, setting a good example teaches our children be safety leaders.
