



Please Respect Personal Time of Staff

There is no doubt that for most of us our lives have changed considerably over the last five weeks and we are all under a lot of stress. In the education field we have been asked to implement a massive change in pedagogy, planning and schooling in a few days. Most teachers are reporting that the planning for online lessons has easily doubled their work. We are proud of the work that all staff are doing but we need your help. Please limit your communication with our staff to the regular school school hours within the day(8:30 am to 3:15 pm). Much of their time outside of the regular school day is now being spent with planning. We need to ensure that staff remain healthy and strong so that they can do the best they can with your kids.

Student Assessment

The online world presents many interesting challenges. One of the biggest, is the valid assessment of student achievement. When students are present in the classroom the teacher can question, watch students work through questions/challenges and constantly gather in person formative assessment of what a child knows and is able to do. This assists teachers with their planning. In the online setting, this can be more difficult. The validity of tests and quizzes can also be questioned. Thus as we move towards the final two months in the school year staff will be prioritizing key outcomes and skills to focus on. Teachers will not be able to assess the same number of outcomes that they would normally do on the third term final report card. In some subject areas much of the students final summative assessment will be based upon work to the middle of March and then on best evidence that can be gathered until the end of the school year. The focus will be on growth and readiness for the next school grade.

Education Week 2020 in Alberta

Every year in Alberta students, staff and communities celebrate Education Week across the province. The theme for the week is Learning is a Journey. I think everyone will agree that this is an historic year in education in Alberta and around the world. There is no doubt that we are all on a journey this school year! Students, staff and parents all working together to provide our children with the opportunity to learn and ask questions. Let's celebrate our accomplishments this school year and reflect upon what we miss most about a traditional school setting. The relationships that are developed student to student, student



to staff and parent to staff. As we move through this Pandemic it will be exciting to see how we can bring the best of an online experience and teaching pedagogy to the classroom in a traditional school setting.

Online Learning Considerations

We have now completed four weeks of online learning. It seems much longer than that! Hopefully by now, you have been able to establish the following for your children:

- 1. A pretty predictable routine or schedule.
- 2. A good learning space/environment for your child to work.
- Creation of a checklist for the day or the week. (this could be different for each child. Do not expect that each of your children will be able to complete the same amount of work.)
- 4. Implementation of breaks and rest time. Be sure that your child has time for independent play, outside and inside activity time and "mini" breaks during school time.

Plans are being developed to redeploy certificated staff in critical areas that require support and continuity.

School Council

We had our first <u>Online School Council Meeting</u> on Wednesday, April 22. A really nice turnout and we thank all the parents who attended. Our School Trustee Chairperson Mr. Joe Becigneul updated us on some events around the Division along with Good News. He also informed us that our School Superintendent, Mr. David Keohane announced his retirement at the end of the school year. The Board has begun the process to find a replacement. Mr. Becigneul thanked Mr. Keohane for his outstanding leadership in helping our Division to be one of the top performing Divisions in our province and country. Mrs. Kleparchuk reviewed some of the school activities that took place from our last meeting in February. School administration





reviewed the 2020/21 Basic School Fees. Our school administration is required to raise the school fee from \$68 to \$88 per student. Most of this increase is necessitated by the need to pay for two Full Time Lunch Supervisors. There will be no fees at the ECS level unless a student is registered in Full Day or Progressive Options for kindergarten. At this time administration is predicting an increase in school population for the 20/21 school year to approximately 220 students K - 9. However, this may not be accurate as the school was not able to have it's Open House in March. Additional registrations from new students could occur later in the spring, we are also waiting for a small percentage of parents who have children currently attending SAA to complete registration. Mr. Lamer also provided us with a bit of information regarding assessment and end of year reporting. He indicated that we will receive more information about this from our Division. Mr. Lamer reported that administrative designations should be determined soon so he would expect that the Division would be announcing the name of the next Principal at SAA, likely in the next couple of weeks.

Mrs. Bergstrom indicated that she will be representing our School Council at ASCA Annual General Meeting that will be conducted virtually in the near future. Mrs. Broccoli wanted us to be aware that **Partners in Prayer** are still meeting online to pray for the monthly intentions of students and staff. They also welcome intentions that families may want to forward. Mrs. Hoskins indicated that the **Staff Appreciation Committee** have created some tentative plans but will wait to see how things evolve before finalizing some plans to recognize staff. We had a discussion about the Family Movie Knight. It was successful but we may need to have more discussion about behavior expectations of children at the event. There was agreement that it was a good discussion. We hope you can enjoy us for our next meeting on May 20@6:30 pm. Once again, anyone interested in attending the meeting must send Mr. Lamer an email so that a link invite can be sent out prior to the meeting.

Friends of SAA Society

On behalf of the Friends of SAA Society Mrs. Rouse was happy to report that over \$600 was raised from the Family Movie Knight in March and that just over \$200 was raised in the Easter Fundraiser. A great start for the Friends of SAA Society! She did indicate that laws require a Society to have insurance. Some of the proceeds will be used to pay the insurance costs for our Society that she had secured for Movie Knight in March until October of 2020. She also indicated that insurance costs are rising and we may not be able to secure insurance in the future through the Divisions provider. All parents were reminded that there will be costs in the future for repair and upkeep of playground equipment as well as anticipated future needs of our students during difficult times in education funding. At this time due to the COVID 19 epidemic Friends of SAA have decided not to plan any fundraiser activities during the remainder of the school year.

St. Albert Parish News

Dear Parishioners!

This year, after a very different (but no less fruitful and beautiful) Holy Week and the celebration of Christ's Resurrection, we come to this 2nd Sunday of Easter known as the Divine Mercy Sunday. If at any stage in your life you have the opportunity to go to Poland, try to visit Łagiewniki, a district of the city of Krakow, in the capital of the Divine Mercy devotion. Łagiewniki receives approximately two million pilgrims a year. They come to see the original Divine Mercy painting and to visit the tomb of St. Faustina Kowalska who received the Divine Mercy revelations. Many people experience amazing answers when they pray at her tomb.

The celebration of Divine Mercy Sunday is an invitation from Jesus to each one of us to come to his Most Sacred Heart. The apostle Thomas went from doubting Jesus' Resurrection to professing his faith in Jesus and declaring Jesus' divinity, with the words, "My Lord and my God." What happened? He encountered the love of Jesus. We could say he encountered the love of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Thomas said he would believe if he could place his hand in the wound in Jesus' side. Jesus said to him, "...bring your hand and put it into my side..." (John 20:27) Thomas said, "My Lord and My God." Now when Thomas sees the wound in Christ's side he is overcome. Thomas saw the love of the Sacred Heart of Jesus for him. He saw a heart that is wounded, wounded out of love for humanity, the Sacred Heart that took the sin of humanity upon itself. I remember once telling a young person about the Divine Mercy devotion. When I finished I asked if they had any questions. "Yes," one person said, "what does mercy mean?" To answer I had to go back to the Latin word, "misericordia." It has two parts: "cordia" which means "heart" and "miseri" which means "suffering." Mercy is a "heart for those who suffer." That is what love does. Love suffers for the other and Thomas saw this suffering wounded love before his eyes in the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

Have you ever had a bad weekend? Just think of what kind of weekend the apostles had on that first Easter weekend. Jesus was dead. The crowd that welcomed Jesus with palms as he entered Jerusalem turned against him on Good Friday morning calling for the release of Barabbas and the death

of Jesus. The apostles, now afraid of the crowd, had shut themselves in for their own protection as we heard in the Gospel (John 20:19). Jesus came to them in that difficult time with the words, "Peace be with you." Peace signifies Divine Mercy.

This year we can look even deeper at the mystery of the Divine Mercy. It shows what we human beings most need: God's mercy, his forgiveness - and mercy toward each other, a heart for those who suffer. During this Easter season we are talking about becoming disciples and disciple- makers. A disciple receives God's mercy and extends it to others. Let us accept God's invitation to celebrate and practice mercy. One way the Church celebrates God's mercy throughout the year is through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Finding time for Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is another good way to receive and give thanks for Divine Mercy. It is mainly through the corporal and spiritual works of mercy that we practice mercy in our daily lives and are enabled to receive God's mercy. Let us entrust ourselves to God and enable us to see the

Risen Lord in everyone. Let us deepen our faith, trust and love in God and share the message of the Divine Mercy so that there is nobody beyond the reach of God's mercy.

Televised Mass

Salt + Light TV has arranged with cable companies across Canada (Rogers, Bell, Telus, Shaw Direct, Videotron) to make their service available free of charge to all subscribers until 1 May 2020. This means that anyone who subscribes to cable TV will be able to access Salt + Light TV and therefore the Daily TV Mass and Sunday TV Mass produced by the National Catholic Broadcasting Council. Also, "La Messe du jour" that is produced and televised by Salt + Light TV six days a week from the crypt at Saint Joseph Oratory in Montreal will likewise be televised on Sundays now through arrangements with the Archdiocese of Montreal. Salt + Light TV is televising the daily Mass celebrated by Pope Francis from Casa Santa Marta. This airs every morning and will be televised in both English and French.
